

What is Access to Recovery?

Access to Recovery (ATR) IV is a three-year competitive \$7,084,767 grant program, awarded to the Ohio Department of Mental Health and Addiction Services by the federal Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration. Ohio was awarded ATR II, ATR III and, most recently, ATR IV, for a total of \$36,663,363 in funding over 10 years. ATR promotes the integration of a Recovery Oriented System of Care through partnerships with community service providers. When ATR IV concludes, Ohio will have provided services to more than 19,000 Ohio residents through these grants.

The ATR IV grant provides electronic vouchers to a projected 4,362 criminal-justice-involved adults and military service members for the purchase of recovery support and treatment services from a potential cohort of 70 ATR providers, currently in Cuyahoga, Franklin, Hamilton, Lorain, Montgomery, Stark and Summit Counties.

Consumer Choice

The process of recovery is a personal one; achieving recovery can take many pathways. With a voucher, clients will be able to choose the programs and providers that will help them most. Increased choice protects individuals and encourages quality.

Successful Outcomes

Success will be measured by outcomes, principally abstinence from drugs and alcohol, as well as attainment of employment or enrollment in school, no involvement with the criminal justice system, stable housing, social support, access to care, and retention in services.

Increased Capacity

ATR increases the number and types of recovery support service providers (including faith and community-based organizations) eligible to receive federal funding and expands the array of services available, including peer recovery coaching, care coordination, employment skills training and other recovery support services.

Program Highlights
