ODMH Issues Heat-Related Illness Warning

With temperatures and humidity at their current levels, everyone is at risk for heat-related illness. Individuals with mental illness and addictions, along with the very young, the elderly and those with medical problems, are at especially high risk.

During this period of extreme weather:

- Be sure to check on patients residing in the community to be certain they have access to a cool environment and adequate liquids;
- Prior to discharge from hospitals and other residential treatment sites, assure that patients will be going to a safe environment that will protect them from heat-related problems;
- Advise patients of the availability and location of “cooling centers” to use as respite;
- Encourage everyone — including staff — to drink plenty of fluids.

Ohio Prescription Drug Drop Box Program Launched

The Ohio Attorney General’s Office is partnering with the Ohio Department of Health and Drug Free Action Alliance to invite southern Ohio’s law enforcement agencies to participate in the newly established Ohio Prescription Drug Drop Box Program. The pilot program will provide approximately 75 drop boxes to collect prescription drugs and at least three incinerators to destroy them. The drop boxes are secure mailbox-style disposal boxes that can be placed inside law enforcement departments where residents can walk in and deposit their unwanted, expired or unused prescription drugs. The portable drug incinerators will be provided to agencies that are able and willing to serve as a regional destruction site for the pills collected from other drug drop boxes in the area. ODADAS is also supporting the pilot program through funding provided to the Drug Free Action Alliance.

Law enforcement agencies in the following counties are eligible to apply for the pilot program: Adams, Athens, Brown, Butler, Clermont, Clinton, Fayette, Gallia, Greene, Hamilton, Highland, Hocking, Jackson, Lawrence, Meigs, Montgomery, Pickaway, Pike, Preble, Ross, Scioto, Vinton, Warren and Washington.



Ohio, Indiana Team Up on Prescription Drug Monitoring Pilot Program

The Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) has launched a new pilot program to expand and improve access to prescription drug records for physicians, pharmacists and emergency departments in Ohio and Indiana. The program, launched by the HHS Health IT Division, is designed to make it easier for physicians to use prescription drug monitoring databases by providing real-time information. Government data will be merged with the electronic health records systems used in doctors’ offices and pharmacies. In Indiana, emergency department staff will be encouraged to access patients’ prescription histories through a database already used in hospitals in the state. The Ohio project will test a new drug risk indicator in the electronic health record, and will determine how that affects doctors’ decision making. “Technology plays a critical role in our comprehensive efforts to address our nation’s prescription drug abuse epidemic,” Gil Kerlikowske, Director of National Drug Control Policy, said in a [news release](#).



Summit County Training Examines Risks, Myths of Marijuana

More than 350 treatment professionals and members of the community attended the *Marijuana: What's the Big Deal?* Conference in Summit County where local and national experts provided information about current trends and myths associated with marijuana use. In addition, participants learned about the effects of marijuana on the brain, particularly on the developing adolescent brain, how marijuana is used for medicinal purposes and the role of the FDA. Finally, those in attendance became aware of efforts to pass medical marijuana legislation in Ohio and how other states have been impacted with the passage of similar legislation.

The Summit County ADAMHS Board, in partnership with local health and social service providers, sponsored the workshop to alert attendees about the dangers of marijuana usage and to educate them about the potential legislation.

Jerry Craig, Executive Director of the ADAMHS Board, said, "We were very pleased by the positive response to the conference and that those in attendance gained an understanding of both the related science and expert opinions about marijuana as medicine. Many of the participants commented on the benefit of learning about the difficulties states like Michigan are facing with the passage of medical marijuana legislation and vowed to share the information they learned to help educate others. One of the many positive outcomes of this event is that over forty conference participants have volunteered to serve as part of a local task force to help disseminate this important information."

Study: 74 Percent of Teens in Colorado Treatment Programs Used Diverted Medical Marijuana

As the medical marijuana debate swirls in Ohio, a new study shows that three-quarters of teenage patients in substance abuse treatment programs in Denver, CO said they used someone else's medical marijuana. The study revealed that 121 of 164 teenage patients (73.8 percent) have ever used medical marijuana prescribed to someone else. Patients reported using diverted medical marijuana from one to 1,000 times, with a median of 50 times, suggesting that most adolescent patients have used medical marijuana on multiple occasions, according to Stacy Salomonsen-Sautel, PhD, a post-doctoral fellow at the University of Colorado Anschutz Medical Campus, Division of Substance Dependence. She reported the findings at the recent College on Problems of Drug Dependence, and the study appears online in the [Journal of the American Academy of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry](#). Drug Free Action Alliance and the Alcohol and Drug Abuse Prevention Association of Ohio cite diversion concerns in their [position paper](#) on medical marijuana. Ohio Human Trafficking Task Force Submits Recommendations

The Ohio Human Trafficking Task Force submitted a [report](#) to Gov. John R. Kasich this month that contains 26 recommendations the state of Ohio should act upon to better coordinate efforts to identify and rescue victims of human trafficking, create a coordinated law enforcement system to investigate these crimes, and provide services and treatment to trafficking victims.

Recommendations in the report are intended to compliment [House Bill 262](#), legislation that increases penalties for human trafficking, provides protection for victims, and supports new programs to raise awareness and train individuals to identify signs of human trafficking. The bill was sponsored by State Rep. Teresa Fedor (D-Toledo).

Created by Gov. Kasich on March 29, 2012, via Executive Order 2012-06K, the Ohio Human Trafficking Task Force is led by members of the Governor's Office and includes directors of 10 state agencies and one state board. The Task Force also receives a great deal of input from numerous stakeholder groups and individuals involved in the fight to end human trafficking.

Regional Forensics Trainings Allow Criminal Justice and Mental Health Treatment Professionals to Share Perspectives on Risk Assessment of People Returning to Community Settings

This June, the Ohio Department of Mental Health (ODMH) wrapped up the last of six Regional Forensic Trainings that brought together various stakeholder groups who are either directly or peripherally involved in the forensic mental health system. The trainings provided basic knowledge about the roles and responsibilities of various entities involved in the assessment, treatment and monitoring of individuals who are eligible for conditional release, that is, people who have been found by the court to be not guilty by reason of insanity or incompetent to stand trial—unrestorable under criminal court jurisdiction.

Audience members consisted of representatives from the criminal court system, local ADAMHS/CMH Boards and community providers that treat people on conditional release. Staff from each ODMH Regional Psychiatric Hospital (RPH), representatives from the Community Forensic Psychiatry Centers and Forensic Monitors spoke about their responsibilities. Community treatment providers presented their work with people on conditional release and how they act as the “eyes and ears” for the Forensic Monitors. In addition, judges from the local courts and representatives of ADAMHS/CMH boards discussed their responsibilities and perspectives.

The trainings in Cincinnati, Columbus, Northfield, Athens, Massillon and Toledo were co-sponsored by the Ohio Association of County Behavioral Health Authorities (OACBHA), the Ohio Judicial Conference, and the Ohio Council of Behavioral and Family Services Providers (The Ohio Council). Rx Drug Abuse, Depression, Suicidal Thoughts in College Students Linked

A new study from researchers at Western Illinois University (WIU) finds college students who use prescription drugs for non-medical purposes are at increased risk of depression and thoughts of suicide. The researchers analyzed the answers of 26,600 college students who participated in a national research survey by the American College Health Association. Students were asked about their non-medical prescription drug use, including painkillers, antidepressants, sedatives and stimulants, as well as their mental health symptoms in the past year. About 13 percent of students reported non-medical prescription drug use, according to a [WIU press release](#). Those who reported feeling sad, hopeless, depressed or considered suicide were significantly more likely to report non-medical use of any prescription drug. The link between these feelings and prescription drug abuse was more pronounced in females, the researchers report in [Addictive Behaviors](#). The researchers conclude that students may be inappropriately self-medicating psychological distress with prescription medications.
