

## Prevention Works! A Guide for Red Ribbon throughout the Year Released to Ohio Schools

As part of October's National Substance Abuse Prevention Month outreach efforts, Ohio's authorities on healthy, drug free lifestyles released a web-based toolkit titled, *Prevention Works! A Guide for Red Ribbon throughout the Year*. The toolkit is full of practical and easy-to-use messages and tools to help teachers deliver prevention-focused information to their students. The Ohio Department of Alcohol and Drug Addiction Services (ODADAS) partnered with the Ohio Department of Education (ODE) and Drug Free Action Alliance to develop the toolkit and activity guide to bring drug free messages into the classroom year-round.



"While October is Substance Abuse Prevention Month, all day, every day is a good time for modeling healthy behaviors and for providing education on making good choices for Ohio's children and young adults," commented ODADAS Director Orman Hall. "One of the most important factors in achieving student success in the classroom, and later in life, is a student's ability to stay drug and alcohol free."

The Prevention Works! resources drive home the fact that a majority of young people are alcohol and drug free. In fact, according to the *2011 Ohio Youth Risk Behavior Survey*:

- 76.4% of high school students did NOT use marijuana in the past 30 days
- 78.9% of high school students did NOT smoke cigarettes in the past 30 days
- 62% of high school students did NOT drink alcohol in the past 30 days

### Medicaid Beneficiaries Begin Signing Up for Health Homes Benefit

During October, the Medicaid Health Home benefit began in five counties for beneficiaries who live with serious and persistent mental illness. Five providers are certified to offer the Health Home service in the counties they serve – three in Lucas County, one in Butler, and one serving Adams, Lawrence and Scioto counties. Case management provided through the health home will coordinate mental health services, physical health treatment, preventive care and community supports. This is a significant policy initiative for the Governor's Office of Health Transformation, led by the Department of Mental Health in partnership with Ohio Medicaid. ### ODMH, DYS Partner to Link Youth to Services

The Ohio Departments of Mental Health and Youth Services will work together to provide youth offenders with behavioral health needs with community supports to promote a successful return into their communities. To help these youth achieve successful reentry, the departments have developed a **Community Linkage Program** for juveniles leaving DYS facilities who have mental health issues.



Goals for the program include securing appropriate linkage to services and supports for the youth, establishing relationships with stakeholders, collecting data, analyzing outcomes and maintaining timely and quality information dissemination to the community. ### Peer Employment Project Set to Begin

Work can be an essential component to recovery for people with mental illnesses. The Ohio Department of Mental Health (ODMH), the Ohio Rehabilitation Services Commission (RSC), and the Ohio Association of County Behavioral Health Authorities (OACBHA) are collaborating to offer job training through a Peer Employment Project that launches this month. The project trains consumers of mental health services to become Certified Peer Specialists (CPSs) through a combination of classroom instruction and paid internships. Once certified, the peer specialists will be marketable for employment at various human services provider agencies. Their jobs would be to act as recovery catalysts for agency clients by offering “peer support services.”

Peer support services are designed for people whose daily functioning at home, work and/or in the community has been significantly impaired by severe and persistent mental illness. The goal is to decrease the isolation that these individuals may experience and assist them in setting goals, make informed choices, connecting with resources, and dealing with the conflicts and stress of everyday living. The CPS can share his or her experience, strength and hope from a unique personal recovery perspective. To be eligible for the CPS training, individuals must be age 18 or older, be diagnosed with a severe and persistent mental illness and have received treatment in the community behavioral health system. Individuals are referred to RSC’s vocational rehabilitation program via their local ADAMH/CMH Boards. The ODMH-funded Ohio Empowerment Coalition will provide the 86 hours of specialized training, after which participants will begin 30 weeks of paid internships.



Cuyahoga, Logan-Champaign, Portage and Stark County Mental Health and Recovery Boards have referred 19 consumers to RSC for participation in the first Peer Employment Project class set to begin Nov. 16 at the Cuyahoga County ADAMH Board. All 19 consumers were on the RSC existing caseload. Current internship sites are: Recovery Resources, Catholic Charities, Future Directions, Life Exchange Center and Living Miracles in Cuyahoga County; RTC Employment and Residential Administrators, Inc. in Logan-Champaign counties; Community Services of Stark County and Foundations in Stark County; and Coleman Professional Services serving both Stark and Portage counties. An additional project is being considered for Trumbull County and would involve training three additional Certified Peer Specialists.

The expectation is that CPS will become a Medicaid billable service by July 1, 2013. CPS positions could be a valuable addition at a variety of community sites, such as those that focus on housing, adult care, independent living, community mental health, criminal justice reentry or assistance to veterans. 



## Emergency and Acute Care Facility Opioid and Other Controlled Substances Prescribing Guidelines

Under the leadership of the Governor's Cabinet Opiate Action Team (GCOAT) Professional Education Workgroup (PEW) Emergency Department Opiate Prescribing Guidelines Committee, the *Emergency and Acute Care Facility Opioid and Other Controlled Substances Prescribing Guidelines (ED Guidelines)* were developed to help emergency and other acute care facilities reduce inappropriate prescribing of opioid pain medication while preserving their vital role of treating patients with emergent medical conditions. They are intended to provide appropriate clinical guidance for the prescribing of opioids and other controlled substances in the unique acute care environment where the treatment of pain is frequently indicated without the benefit of an established patient-doctor relationship. The guidelines are not intended to take the place of clinical judgment, which should always be utilized in order to provide the most appropriate care to meet the unique needs of each patient. ## Experts Say Mental Health Effects of Hurricane Sandy Could Be Powerful

Psychologists warn the mental health effects of Hurricane Sandy could be powerful, *HealthDay* reported. "Sandy, like all natural disasters, is considered a criterion 'A1' stressor in the diagnoses of acute stress disorder in the first month after the event and post-traumatic stress disorder, at least a month after the event," said Simon Rego, director of Psychology Training at Montefiore Medical Center/Albert Einstein College of Medicine in New York City. Symptoms may include insomnia, irritability, feeling numb or detached from others, restlessness, or feeling in a daze, Rego noted. Some people closest to the destruction could experience flashbacks, while others may avoid people or places that remind them of the event. To help Ohioans impacted by the storm, the Ohio Department of Mental Health's Office of Community Support and Emergency Preparedness shared [Managing the Emotional Consequences of Storms and Flooding: Understanding the Impact and Exploring Strategies for Coping with Weather Emergencies](#) with first responders and Ohio emergency management personnel.

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## Nationwide Survey Asks, "What's Your Life Like in Recovery?"

Faces & Voices of Recovery is conducting the first nationwide survey designed to document key aspects in the lives of people in recovery from addiction to alcohol and other drugs. Information collected will be used to inform the public, policymakers, service planners and providers and the recovery community - about the milestones that people achieve in recovery. Results will also be used by Faces & Voices to educate the public about recovery and to address discriminatory barriers facing people in or seeking recovery. ### New Resource for Educators Focuses on Prescription Drug Abuse and Misuse

The National Education Association Health Information Network has released a new teaching resource, *Rx for Understanding*, focused on the growing problem of prescription drug abuse and misuse. The resource includes 10 cross-curricular lessons for middle school students. Aligned with the *National Health Education Standards* and *Common Core State Standards*, the lessons aim to equip students with the understanding and decision-making skills they need to recognize and avoid the dangers of misusing and abusing prescription drugs. The materials were developed with the support of an educational grant from Purdue Pharma L.P. Designed to be used across the curriculum, the resources are available free of charge, in [print](#) and [online](#).

### Study: Doctor Visits for Drug or Alcohol Use Increased 70 Percent Between 2001 and 2009

The number of doctor visits for substance use disorders increased 70 percent among American adults between 2001 and 2009, according to a new study published in the *Archives of Internal Medicine*. The increase appears to be driven in large part by prescription drug abuse, the researchers said. The researchers analyzed data from two national surveys of physician visits, and found the number of visits involving drug or alcohol abuse or addiction rose from 10.6 million between 2001 and 2003, to 18 million between 2007 and 2009. The number of visits involving a diagnosis of opioid abuse rose almost sixfold, from 772,000 to 4.4 million. The study found the number of people prescribed medications to treat substance use disorders during doctors' visits rose from 643,000 to 3.9 million during the study period. Buprenorphine and methadone were the most commonly prescribed medications. Talk therapy was used in about 25 million patients during the same period.



### Underage Drinking Enforcement Training Center (UDET) Releases Online College e-Kit

The Underage Drinking Enforcement Training Center has released an online College e-Kit. The *e-Kit* is designed to connect law enforcement, prevention advocates, campus representatives, students, and other community leaders with helpful resources to effectively reduce underage student access to alcohol and to reduce consumption of alcoholic beverages through use of environmental management practices.

### U.S. Treasury: All Federal Benefits Will Be Paid Electronically

The U.S. Department of the Treasury now requires all federal benefit and non-tax payments to be paid electronically. People applying for Social Security, Veterans Affairs or other federal benefits will receive their payments electronically starting with their first payment. People currently receiving federal benefit checks must switch to an electronic payment option by March 1, 2013. People who do not choose an electronic payment option by March 1, 2013, or at the time they apply for federal benefits, will receive their payments via the Direct Express® card so they will not experience any interruption in payment. This change makes it more important than ever to encourage federal benefit recipients to sign up for electronic payments now.
