SUBJECT: SFY 2011 Ohio Prescription Drug Abuse Funding (OPDAF)

Attached are the SFY 2011 OPDAF allocations (Program Code 2090H). The entire allocation will be provided to the Boards this week.

These funds can be used as non-federal funding to pay Medicaid claims (the same as FFP used today) but they may not be deposited in a reserve or "rainy day" fund. The mCPE system will be updated to include an "OPDAF" funding source that will have the same restrictions as the AoD ARRA FFP Reimbursements; it cannot be transferred to other fund accounts nor can funds from other accounts be transferred to it. Within the mCPE application, ODADAS will be able to monitor spending but only for Medicaid claims. If the funding is not used for Medicaid claim payment purposes, Boards are limited to expending it on alcohol and other drug treatment services. In either instance, the person receiving services paid for by this funding must also be reported in the Ohio Behavioral Health (OHBH) as having a drug of choice in the opiate category. This funding must be encumbered or expended by Boards no later than June 30, 2011.

The ODADAS Board Level Financial Reporting for SFY 2011 will be updated to include a reporting column for this funding source. ODADAS will compare reported expenditures in this category to assure 1) full funding has been expended and 2) funding is only reported as expended on treatment services.

Procedures for Tracking Ohio Prescription Drug Abuse Funding (OPDAF)
allocations, clients and services**

Funding

Per the amended Medicaid Interagency Agreement between ODADAS and ODJFS, the source of funding is reimbursed FFP to ODJFS. It is only the FFP portion associated with the Federal Medical Assistance Percentage (FMAP) adjustment due to the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (ARRA). Therefore, it can be used as non-federal funding to pay Medicaid claims (the same as FFP is used today) but is also precluded from being deposited in a reserve or "rainy day" fund. The mCPE system will be updated to include an "OPDAF" funding source that will have the same restrictions as the AoD ARRA FFP Reimbursements; it cannot be transferred to other fund accounts nor can funds from other accounts be transferred to it. Within the mCPE application, ODADAS will be able to monitor spending but only for Medicaid claims. If the funding is not used for Medicaid claim payment purposes, Boards are limited to expending it on alcohol and other drug treatment services. In either instance, the person receiving services paid for by this funding must also be reported in the Ohio Behavioral Health (OHBH) as having a drug of choice in the opiate category. This funding is expected to be expended to providers no later than June 30, 2011.

The ODADAS Board Level Financial Reporting for SFY 2011 will be updated to include a reporting column for this funding source. ODADAS will compare reported expenditures in this category to assure 1) full funding has been expended and 2) funding is only reported as expended on treatment services.

Clients and services

In order to track clients and services, a combination of information from the Ohio Behavioral Health (OHBH) and MACSIS will be used as each has certain limitations based upon the role they serve. For MACSIS, an affiliation code "OPDAF – Opioid Prescription Drug Abuse Funding" will be set up that can be "attached" to clients receiving services that are being provided to treat individuals with a drug of choice in the opiate category and are funded in part or in whole with this funding source. Services provided and the provider (ODADAS-certified treatment program) of those services can be identified during the time the affiliation code is active with a client.

Because MACSIS utilizes a billing diagnosis, claims for these clients may not reflect the opiate category as the diagnosis if there are multiple conditions being treated. Therefore, OHBH records associated with these clients will be utilized to verify that a reported "drug of choice" is in one of the three opiate categories. Additionally, the admission and discharge dates can be used to validate the affiliation period from MACSIS.
