2013 Annual Summary of Infectious Diseases



Map Information:

This map represents the number of reported Hepatitis C cases (past or present, acute or non-acute) per 100,000. Hepatitis C (HCV) is a liver disease caused by the HCV virus. Intravenous drug use is the leading risk factor for HCV infection. In 2013 the highest HCV rates were in Pickaway (1,459.2), Union (601.3) and Scioto (309.6) counties. The lowest HCV rates were in Paulding (10.4), Geauga (13.9) and Holmes (13.9) counties.
