
## SFY2015 Site Visits and Monitoring Tool

# Homelessness

**The goal of the PATH Program is to reduce or eliminate homelessness for individuals with serious mental illnesses or co-occurring serious mental illness and substance use disorders who experience homelessness or are at imminent risk of becoming homeless.**




# Homelessness

## Homeless:

HUD has issued the final regulation to implement changes to the definition of homelessness contained in the Homeless Emergency Assistance and Rapid Transition to Housing Act. The definition affects who is eligible for various HUD-funded homeless assistance programs. The new definition includes four broad categories of homelessness:


- People who are living in a place not meant for human habitation, in emergency shelter, in transitional housing, or are exiting an institution where they temporarily resided. The only significant change from existing practice is that people will be considered homeless if they are exiting an institution where they resided for up to 90 days (it was previously 30 days), and were in shelter or a place not meant for human habitation immediately prior to entering that institution.



# Homelessness

## Homeless:

- People who are losing their primary nighttime residence, which may include a motel or hotel or a doubled up situation, within 14 days and lack resources or support networks to remain in housing. HUD had previously allowed people who were being displaced within 7 days to be considered homeless. The proposed regulation also describes specific documentation requirements for this category.
- Families with children or unaccompanied youth who are unstably housed and likely to continue in that state. This is a new category of homelessness, and it applies to families with children or unaccompanied youth who have not had a lease or ownership interest in a housing unit in the last 60 or more days, have had two or more moves in the last 60 days, and who are likely to continue to be unstably housed because of disability or multiple barriers to employment.




# Homelessness

## Homeless:

- People who are fleeing or attempting to flee domestic violence, have no other residence, and lack the resources or support networks to obtain other permanent housing. This category is similar to the current practice regarding people who are fleeing domestic violence.




# Homelessness

## Chronic Homelessness:

An individual is determined to be chronically homeless if he or she has a diagnosed disability—such as severe mental illness, substance use disorder, developmental disorder, or other ongoing medical condition—and has been homeless for at least one continuous year or has experienced at least four episodes of homelessness in the past three years. Because of these factors, these individuals are among the most costly in the homeless population.





# Homelessness

## **PATH-Eligible Services:**


- Outreach
- Screening and Diagnostic Treatment
- Habilitation and Rehabilitation
- Community Mental Health, including recovery support such as peer specialist/recovery coaches
- Alcohol or drug treatment
- Staff training, including training of individuals who work in shelters, MH Clinics, SA programs, and other sites where individuals who experience homelessness require services



# Homelessness

## **PATH-Eligible Services:**


- Case Management, including preparing a plan for the provision of community mental health services to eligible homeless individuals involved, and reviewing such plan not less than once every three months;
  - Providing assistance in obtaining and coordinating social and maintenance services for eligible individuals who experience homelessness, including services relating to daily living activities, peer support services, personal financial planning, transportation services, and habilitation and rehabilitation services, prevocational and vocational services, and housing services;



# Homelessness

## **PATH-Eligible Services:**


- Providing assistance to eligible individuals who experience homelessness in obtaining income support, including housing assistance, food stamps, and supplemental security income benefits;
- Referring eligible individuals who experience homelessness for such other services as may be appropriate; and
- Providing representative payee services in accordance with section 1631(a)(2) of the Social Security Act if the eligible individuals who experience homelessness are receiving aid under title XVI of such act and if the applicant is designated by the Secretary to provide to provide such services;



# Homelessness

## **PATH-Eligible Services:**

- Supportive and supervisory services in residential services;
- Referral for primary health services, job training, educational services, and relevant housing services; and
- Housing services as specified in Section 522(b)(10) of the Public Health Service Act, including:
  - Minor renovation, expansion, and repair of housing
  - Planning of housing
  - Technical assistance in applying for housing assistance
  - Improving the coordination of housing services
  - Security deposits
  - Costs associated with matching eligible individuals who are experiencing homelessness with appropriate housing situations; and
  - One-time rental payments to prevent eviction


