

Admission Criteria


- Age: 8-24 years old
- Warren or Clinton County resident OR is a youth served at Warren County Learning Center or Southern Ohio Learning Center regardless of county residence
- History of aggression or severe Behavioral Health symptoms
- Must have either a mental health diagnosis or a developmental disability diagnosis or both
- Family involvement required if <18 years old
- Returning from placement or at risk of placement

Clients Served



- While in program: 14%



Incarceration (Juvenile Detention or Jail):

Experiences and Lessons Learned

- *Very thankful for state funding due to the ambitious Project Design & Cost*
- *Partnerships are key*
- *Staff Recruitment remains an issue*
- *Need to enhance trauma informed approaches at Learning Center by educational staff*
- *Ancillary services very helpful but can be challenging:*
 - *Limited options for respite – Working with Camp Joy to expand capacity*
 - *Large family bonding events can be “drama-filled” – better to have smaller ones or individual family activities*
