SAMHSA Block Grant Application/Plan

- ▶ Application for 2 Block Grants
 - ▶ Substance Abuse Treatment & Prevention - \$64 million
 - ▶ Mental Health Treatment - \$12 million
- ▶ Non-competitive grant to states
- ▶ Ohio does combined Application/Plan every 2 years
 - ▶ Short application for second year
 - ▶ Separate implementation reports due Dec. 1 every year

Overview of Ohio's Community Mental Health and Addiction System

- ▶ Ohio's 50 county Alcohol, Drug Addiction and Mental Health Boards plan, evaluate & fund services with state oversight.
- ▶ State oversight provided by OhioMHAS which licenses and certifies providers, and provides some funding
- ▶ Ohio Department of Medicaid is major funder of treatment services, as well as OhioMHAS, local tax levies
- ▶ Partnerships with health and human services

OhioMHAS Licenses & Certifies

- ▶ Prevention providers - 194
- ▶ Behavioral health treatment providers - 600
- ▶ Peer operated services - 86
- ▶ Residential
 - ▶ Adult Care Facilities & Foster Homes - 942
 - ▶ MH Residential - 146
 - ▶ SUD Residential - 154
- ▶ Private Psychiatric Units - 87

OhioMHAS Provides Treatment

- ▶ State (regional) Psychiatric Hospitals - 6
- ▶ Substance abuse treatment programs in 27 state prisons
- ▶ Therapeutic community programs in state prisons - 6

Ohio Legislature

New Continuum of Care Requirements

- ▶ Requires specific services be available in each county
- ▶ Mandates waiting lists

Ohio Behavioral Health Redesign led by Governor's Office of Health Transformation

- ▶ **Elevation:** Financing of Medicaid behavioral health services moved from county administrators to the state - July 1, 2012
- ▶ **Expansion:** Ohio implemented Medicaid Expansion to extend Medicaid coverage to more low income Ohioans, including 500,000 residents with behavioral health needs. - January 1, 2014
- ▶ **Modernization:** Ohio Department of Medicaid and OhioMHAS are charged with modernizing the behavioral health benefit package to align with national standards and expand services to those most in need. - January 1, 2018
- ▶ **Integration:** Post benefit modernization, the Medicaid benefit will fully be integrated into Medicaid managed care. - July 1, 2018

Ohio's Strengths

- ▶ Medicaid Redesign for MH and SUD to align with national standards and serve those most in need
- ▶ Strong partnerships with criminal justice system to operate SUD treatment programs in the prisons
- ▶ Strong partnerships with courts; OhioMHAS provides \$8 million in funding for MAT in drug courts and \$5 million in specialized docket program.

Ohio's Needs

- ▶ Ohio ranks second nationally in opioid overdose deaths; 3,050 deaths in 2015
- ▶ Health disparities among population groups
- ▶ Housing needs for persons not always met

 - ▶ Children with Serious Emotional Disturbance (SED)
 - ▶ Adults with Serious Mental Illness (SMI)

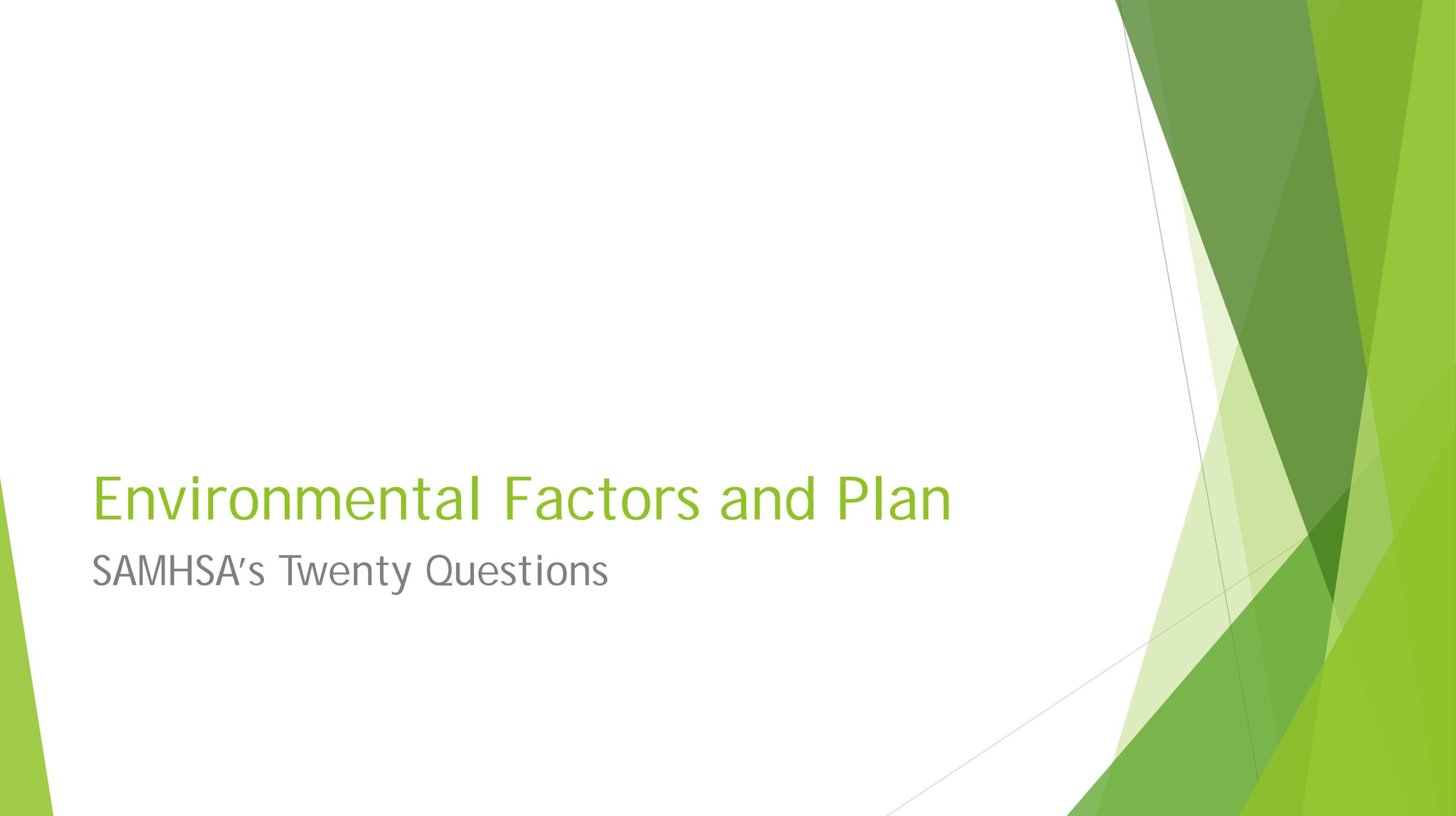

SAMHSA's Statutory Requirements Prevention

- ▶ Needs Assessment/Data Collection - State Epidemiological Workgroup
- ▶ Capacity Building - development of community & workforce
- ▶ Planning - plan, advisory group, evidence-based workgroup
- ▶ Implementation of plan using six strategies
- ▶ Evaluation

SAMHSA Statutory Requirements Substance Abuse Block Grant -Treatment

- ▶ Improve access to services
- ▶ Address primary prevention
- ▶ Services to pregnant women and women with dependent children
- ▶ Persons who Inject drugs - outreach, monitoring
- ▶ Requires service coordination, charitable choice, patient records, independent peer review

SAMHSA Statutory Requirements Mental Health Block Grant

- ▶ Comprehensive community system of care - which organizations provide needed services? Includes services funded by state agencies represented on Planning Council
- ▶ How many people need services? How many people receive services?
- ▶ Children's comprehensive system of care
- ▶ Required special populations: homeless, rural and older adults
- ▶ Management systems - financial resources, staffing, training of emergency MH services staff

- ▶ Trauma
