As part of Ohio's State Opioid Response (SOR) 2.0 initiative, OhioMHAS is has issued the following RFAs today:

RFA: Use of Community Organizations for Integrated Behavioral Health System of Care

MHA-FY21-SOR2.0-UseCommunity-30 seeks to solicit a comprehensive proposal from community organizations to provide services and supports to individuals in their communities with opioid use disorder (OUD), stimulant and other co-occurring substance use disorders. The services and supports must be aimed at supporting a community system of care (prevention, early intervention, treatment and recovery support) that provides linkages between physical health, emergency health care, behavioral health care, criminal justice and child welfare. The services and supports may include prevention services, family supports, primary care, recovery supports, treatment, Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT), faith-based and community-based interventions, and increasing access and continuity of care and supports and/or harm reduction. Attention to services and supports which address improving the social determinants of health are important areas of focus for community partners. All questions must be submitted to SORTreatment@mha.ohio.gov by 11:59 p.m. on Feb. 22. Responses to frequently asked questions will be posted to the OhioMHAS Funding Opportunities web page. The deadline to submit proposals is 11:59 p.m. on Feb. 26. An informational webinar is being planned and will be announced on the OhioMHAS Funding Opportunities page as well. The total amount available statewide for this RFA is \$7 million. Grant awards will not exceed \$150,000 per applicant, per year. Awards will be announced for project implementation to begin March 15, 2021.

RFA: Use of Innovation for Integrated Behavioral Health System of Care

MHA-FY21-SOR2.0-UseInnovation-40 seeks to solicit a comprehensive proposal from organizations including community-based organizations, ADAMH Boards, profit and nonprofit organizations to provide innovative approaches to integrated care for individuals with opioid or stimulant use/misuse disorder. OhioMHAS seeks applications from organizations to expand the utilization of technology to manage co-occurring SUD and mental health conditions. This will include the use of web applications, medical devices, and technology that assists with coordinating activities of state agencies and local county systems through an integrated approach to multi-system needs. Innovative technology will especially assist those with co-occurring disorders through partnerships with community behavioral health agencies and ongoing connection to telehealth and recovery support services including housing, MAT, peer recovery supports and vocational programs. Attention to services and supports which address improving the social determinants of health are important areas of focus for community partners. All questions must be submitted to SORTreatment@mha.ohio.gov by 11:59 p.m. on Feb. 22. Responses to frequently asked questions will be posted to the OhioMHAS Funding Opportunities web page. Sessions will be led by Dr. Marjan Holloway an adjunct faculty member at the Beck Institute for Cognitive Behavior Therapy in Philadelphia, a Diplomate of the Academy of Cognitive Therapy, and an associate professor of Medical and Clinical Psychology and Psychiatry at Uniformed Services University of the Health Sciences (USUHS) in Bethesda, MD. The Ohio State University Wexner Medical Center is seeking participants for Ohio Veterans NOW -- a free pilot program using data-driven Transcranial Magnetic Stimulation (TMS) to improve mental health and problem substance use among veterans. Veterans who are struggling with chronic stress and sleep, mood or focus problems and/or substance use are encouraged to participate. No prior formal diagnosis is necessary. The program, which is supported by OhioMHAS and the Ohio



Department of Veterans Services, is open to all veterans of the U.S. Armed Forces, National Guard or Reserves, who are current residents of Ohio.
