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Bureau of Correctional Recovery Services Mission Statement

To provide evidenced-based treatment, which teaches the skills necessary for offenders to remain drug-free upon release to the community.

Overview

The Ohio Department of Mental Health and Addiction Services along with the Ohio Department of Rehabilitation and Correction have formed a partnership which leverages the combined expertise of each agency in order to provide increased treatment within the prisons and ensure a better connection to clinical and recovery supports for offenders upon release.

The Ohio Department of Mental Health and Addiction Services (OhioMHAS) is committed to providing a comprehensive continuum of substance use disorder (SUD) treatment services. The continuum begins at Ohio Department of Rehabilitation and Correction (DRC) reception centers where offenders receive a SUD screening. For offenders with SUD problems identified by the screening, the next phase of the SUD treatment continuum is provided at parent institutions. A variety of treatment services are offered based on the institutional mission, facility capacity and staffing. Offender participation in these programs is completely and strictly voluntary.

Upon completion of a treatment program, the OhioMHAS staff work with the offender to develop a continuing care plan. This plan will include participation in institutional SUD aftercare activities while incarcerated and a referral to community care when released. SUD services for offenders under DRC supervision in the community are coordinated by eight Chemical Dependency Specialists (CDS). The CDS's are responsible for developing treatment resources, making referrals and providing SUD assessments and interim services to aid with transition back into the community/society. For those not on supervision and who have engaged in Recovery Services treatment they will be referred to the Community Transition Program.

COVID-19 Pandemic Effects

This fiscal year has presented unprecedented challenges for the delivery of substance use disorder (SUD) treatment programs and services. As an effort to reduce the spread of COVID 19 and to protect those individuals within the confines of the Ohio Department of Rehabilitation and Correction (ODRC) institutions, ODRC reduced staff members present in the institutions to those who were designated as essential. Therefore, SUD programs and services were suspended April 6, 2020.

During the time period services were suspended within ODRC institutions, Recovery Services staff members were assigned telework activities and given opportunities to volunteer for other work assignments benefitting the state of Ohio and it's citizens.

Many staff volunteered and diligently work to stand-up, manage and work the MHAS COVID-19 Careline. The Careline was envisioned by Director Lori Criss to be a call center staffed by licensed clinicians who would provide support, linkage and resources for those experiencing increased levels of anxiety and

stress during the pandemic. Recovery Services staff answered this call and staffed the Careline seven days a week from early April through July. As staff transitioned back to their direct care prison services in July the management and services of the line were transitioned over to call centers various locations throughout Ohio. During the Recovery Services operation of this line staff served over 2,000 citizens and provided valuable care and support to the citizens of Ohio during this stressful time.

Recovery Services staff were reassigned during the pandemic to work alongside and provide support for the OhioMHAS Office of Pharmacy Services. Much of this work included distribution of Personal Protective Equipment to responders and government agencies around the state, packaging of medications and support for documentation related to the pandemic and OPS operations.

Two MHAS Recovery Services staff were reassigned to the State of Ohio Emergency Operations Center to provide support to Operations Center personnel during the pandemic response period. Our licensed clinicians provided an opportunity for staff dealing with stress, anxiety and compassion fatigue confidential employee assistance services.

Also, during the pandemic several Recovery Services staff volunteered to assist the MHAS Bureau of Licensure and Certification in the processing of gathering data from agencies across Ohio. These staff contacted agency personnel, gathered required information and processed data required for reporting criteria.


Recovery Services Reentry Initiatives

The link between substance use and criminal activity has been well documented. Research shows the treatment of drug abusing offenders while incarcerated can be very effective. Additional research also shows treatment gains while incarcerated can be diminished unless follow-up services are utilized in the community.

The following initiatives comprise the Bureau of Correctional Recovery Services' efforts to provide a seamless system of transition to the community for offenders who have completed SUD treatment while incarcerated:

- **Narcan Project** — Naloxone, sold under the brand name Narcan®, is a medication used to block the effects of opioids, especially in overdose. OhioMHAS and ODRC have partnered to provide inmates with a Narcan® nasal Spray kit upon release from incarceration. The inmates are provided education on opioid effects, risks and overdose potential. They are also given instruction on how to use Narcan Nasal Spray in the event of an opioid overdose post release.
- **Medication-Assisted Treatment** — Medication-Assisted Treatment (MAT) is the use of FDA- approved medications, in combination with counseling and behavioral therapies, to provide a “whole-patient” approach to the treatment of Substance Use Disorders. OhioMHAS and DRC have partnered to implement an initiative focused on combating the opiate epidemic. Individuals qualifying for treatment with an alcohol dependence disorder and/or an opioid dependence disorder may receive their initial injection of Naltrexone (Vivitrol) prior to release. They are then provided with extensive re-entry services to support their continued recovery upon release.
- **Chemical Dependency Specialists (CDS)** — The CDS's are charged with ensuring that offenders are appropriately linked with community aftercare services. A total of eight CDS staff are located throughout the state. CDS staff is responsible for the following: assessing offender needs, referring to support and treatment activities, increasing access to community SUD programs, conducting some direct treatment, and crisis intervention.
- **Community Transition Program** — The Community Transition Program (CTP) serves to expand existing community capacity to continue treatment services and provide access to recovery supports for individuals with substance use disorders returning to the community. CTP supports may provide access to housing resources, vocational services, peer support and other non-traditional recovery services.
- **Therapeutic Community Alumni Association** — The Therapeutic Community Alumni Association is composed of women and men who have completed an OhioMHAS-DRC Therapeutic Community (TC) program and returned to the community. Their goal is to continue personal growth and remain in recovery. They meet regularly in several Ohio cities to discuss projects and activities in which they can support each other, encourage and be role models for those women and men currently participating in one of the six TC programs, and give back to the community.
- **Winners Circles** — Winners Circles create a means for ex-offenders to live safe, sober and crime-free lifestyles. Together, members develop pro-social tools to apply to problems related to addiction and criminal activity. Groups meet on a weekly basis to discuss the challenges and complexities of life unique to people who have been incarcerated.

Definitions

Brief Intervention Program – A 6 week, 24-hour cognitive behavioral program that uses evidence-based strategies to assist inmates as they work to make positive changes in their criminogenic thoughts and behaviors and patterns of substance use.

Community Transition Program (CTP) – CTP offers a temporary benefit meant to provide support during the first year after release from prison. Resources include Housing, Employment Services, Transportation, Substance Use Treatment, Case Management, Recovery Supports.

In-Reach – In-Reach services are provided by various community providers. The providers meet with inmates who have participated in substance use disorder treatment and desire to participate in services upon release to the community. Services are coordinated by Recovery Services Staff.

Intensive Outpatient Program (IOP) – The Intensive Outpatient Program is a 144-hour program that provides treatment services delivered daily for a minimum of 12 hours a week. A minimum of ten of the hours must be cognitive behavioral treatment specific. The remaining hours will consist of ancillary services.

Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT) – MAT such as prescribed Vivitrol is a way to use medical science to assist people who have substance use disorders; specifically, opioid or alcohol use disorders, engage in and maintain recovery.

NARCAN® KITS – Narcan® nasal spray kit that is distributed prior to release to the community. Narcan® nasal spray blocks or reverses the effects of opioid medication or narcotics such as Heroin, Oxycodone, Hydrocodone, Methadone, etc.

Outpatient Services (OP) – Treatment Services that are provided less than eight hours per week in regularly scheduled sessions for program participants who reside in general population.

Recovery Dorm – A pro-social recovery focused unit with a supportive environment for recovery. Treatment groups could also be provided in these units.

Recovery Maintenance Program – Recovery services provided following the successful completion of the Recovery Services Intensive Outpatient Program that consists of two 1-hour, or one 2-hour professionally facilitated group meetings per week for a total of 8 weeks (16 sessions).

Recovery Services Level of Care (RSL) – The Recovery Services level of Care designates the level of need for SUD Services: R0 = None, R1 = Minimal Need, R2 = Moderate Need, R3 = Considerable Need.

Rule 39 Intervention Program – An intervention for offenders found guilty of institutional Rule 39 violations (positive urine screen). The intervention is offered as part of their sanction. Recovery Services will facilitate this intervention. The intervention is a tool to help start the process of making positive life change. During the process participants are screened to determine their eligibility, appropriateness and motivation to later engage in an Intensive Recovery Services treatment program. Participants attend class two days weekly for two-hour sessions for a four-week duration. This open-ended class allows for referrals to be added at any time.

Self-Help / Fellowship / Alcoholic Anonymous (AA) / Narcotics Anonymous (NA) Meetings – An independent support / fellowship group organized by and for drug abusers and alcoholics to help members achieve and maintain abstinence and/or cope with the effects of drugs and alcohol.

Substance Abuse and Mental Illness (SAMI) – SAMI Intensive Outpatient Program – is made up of 3 distinct programs consisting of a SAMI Treatment Readiness 28-hour program, a SAMI Intensive Outpatient 84-hour program, and a SAMI Recovery Maintenance 24-hour program. Each intensive program is delivered for a minimum of 6 hours weekly and involves additional hours of supplemental services. SAMI Recovery Maintenance is delivered 2 hours weekly. SAMI shall focus on service delivery to those individuals identified as dually diagnosed and seeking substance abuse treatment, while also involved with mental health services. Recovery Services and Mental Health staff shall co-facilitate SAMI treatment.

Substance Abuse Mental Illness – Non-Intensive Program – SAMI Non-Intensive is a 12-week education group that involves various mental health and substance use focused topics and related exercises. Groups meet 1 time weekly for up to 2-hour session

Substance Use Disorder Education Services (SUD) – A SUD service that helps to deliver the knowledge of the consequences and effects of substance use. This service can be used for ancillary programming and can be offered to general population inmates. When this service is used as ancillary programming for IOP participants it must be facilitated by licensed Recovery Services staff members. When this service is used for general population inmates it may be facilitated by either licensed Recovery Services staff members, institution staff or volunteers.

Texas Christian University Drug Screen 5 (TCU) – The TCU is an instrument that serves to identify individuals with a history of drug use or dependency and who therefore should be eligible for treatment options.

Therapeutic Community (TC) – A treatment modality that uses an offender hierarchy in which treatment stages are used to reflect personal and program growth.

Treatment Readiness Program (TRP) – The TRP is a 48-hour program delivered daily for a minimum of 12 hours a week. A minimum of ten of the hours must be cognitive behavioral treatment specific. The remaining hours shall consist of ancillary services. This program incorporates the stages of change model to focus on participant motivation and readiness that will enhance treatment engagement and retention. This program is offered to Recovery Services level 2 and 3 inmates.

Treatment Transfer Program – A 4-week treatment program that is a component of the Treatment Transfer initiative specified in HB64. This 4-week treatment program entails providing the TRP program to those eligible inmates identified for this initiative.

Voluntary Tobacco Cessation Program – A structured voluntary program of education, group discussion, counseling, peer support and written assignments to assist inmates in achieving a tobacco free lifestyle.
